The Community Impact Fund also supports grants to local nonprofit organizations that serve the Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky area. Last year, the CWC provided grants to nonprofits including FOCAS/The Lord's Gym Ministries, Children's Home of Northern Kentucky, Foot Care for the Soul, and Give Like A Mother. The CWC Scholarship Endowment Fund – now in its 95th year - provides monetary support to deserving secondary education students from University of Cincinnati (UC), Mt. St. Joseph University, Northern Kentucky University, and the Cincinnati Art Academy. The CWC's scholarship program is unique because in addition to the monetary support, CWC members serve as mentors to the scholars.


